We would like to thank everyone who attended the Muskoka event and helped to make it one of the most enjoyable weekends for the club in the last couple of years. Special thanks to Martin for his role as M.C.; to Craig, Paul, and Orrin for their judging abilities; and to Paul and Audrey for encouragement and advice. We're also appreciative to the management and staff of both the Cranberry House in Bala, and those of the RMS Segwun, both organizations did there utmost to accommodate us.

In all, some 30 people and 12 Morgans made the trek. This is encouraging given the dwindling numbers and interest experienced for Niagara, in the post MOA years. Last year's event at Burlington, while a great success in terms of the record number of Morgans at the Bronte show, really didn't turn out to be a weekend experience together, as hoped. So this year's version illustrates the desire of members for a Niagara type club get-away. We're feeling optimistic about next autumn and are willing to organize another, hopefully bigger and better meet.

It has been apparent for some time that it's difficult to generate interest in our club events among Morganeers from other clubs. With the exception of stalwarts such as Orrin Geeting and unique events, such as hosting the terminus portion of Morgans Over America. In this light, it is apparent that we should concentrate on the wishes of our members. Paying attention to activities, budgets, and desires that give us the maximum enthusiasm and participation of our relatively small membership.

In this regard, we distributed a questionaire at the Club Weekend. The sampling is inadequate at present. I've included a copy of this questionaire for publication in The Blurb, so that we may receive a wider response of opinions. From the limited feedback to date, it seems there could be interest in another Muskoka Weekend. Taking into consideration comments, next year's could be family oriented, rather than the romantic onus of this year's. We're looking into accommodations that are suitable for pets and children, that are on the ground floor, while not "breaking the bank", yet having a sufficient number of quarters for all attendees to stay at the same location.

It was mentioned that golf could be one of the scheduled activities for those that indulge, while alternate distractions, say a shopping trip, would be available for those so inclined. A rally or Gymkahna could be incorporated in the weekend. Lunch on the Segwun, where chidren are encouraged, could be available for those so wishing, or a trip to Santa's Village theme park, for those wishing to show the kids a good time. Various things are possible. We need your ideas and people to help organize various segments that they are interested in. A resort such as The Shamrock, in Port Carling area, offers a mix of motel rooms and cottages. Cottages offer a number of benefits: roomier, great for congregating in, better for pets, kids, and no stairs. After all, it is "Cottage Country" and this is the most common type of accomodation. Someone said they liked the service at The Cranberry House, having the amenities of a bar and

restaurant on site. Features you don't always get at a motel environment. It's also nice to have grassy area for the cars and the privacy to walk around on site with a drink in your hand. This is possible at a place like The Shamrock, and so are evening bon-fires, canoeing, etc. Other places include meal plans. Another possibility is The Riverside Inn at Bracebride: a Holiday Inn style facility, on the river, in town, full of amenities and close to shopping. What do you think?

To date, it seems there is interest in the ideas for the closer, more affordable events, rather than in the more distant ones. Bronte always is a favourite. Likewise, a Manitoulin driving tour or a trip to the Kingston British Car Show have affirmative responses. Stowe and Virginia, appear less desireable. Other ideas for activities mentioned include attending the Vintage Grand Prix at Watkin's Glen in early September; A trip to Mackinaw Island with a stay at the exquisite Grand Hotel; a "Rally Around The Lakes" (Lake Ontario, etc.) held in conjunction with other clubs; and a "Spring Fling" weekend, possibly in Western Ontario (touring Port Dover, Elora, Kitchener Market, etc.). The Club doesn't do much in May or June, so something at that time would be nice, somewhere, without black flies! Winter events have naturally been lacking. We tried pub nights and they didn't go very well. Perhaps the skilers among us (I know there are some out there) might wish to put a trip together. Rent a chalet, perhaps? Ice fishing, anyone?

Regalia: Orders for the new badge have been brisk. Somewhere between 30 to 50 sold (see Craiq!). We also have a lapel pin, which while not identical to the new badge, is a fair representation, and is available as we speak! Only \$6 each (see Lynn). Other ideas received for regalia with the new logo include: caps, sweat or T-shirts, track suits, licence plate surrounds, crests, BBQ aprons, and head bands (ear warmers). Personally, the licence plate surrounds might have the most initial potential, given our budget. Inscribed with: Morgan Car Club of Canada", or "Morgan: First and Last of the Great Sports Cars", or possibly "Morganeers: First and Last of the Great Partyers"! What say you?

Req and I continued our discussions regarding the formation of a Spouses Support Network (The SSN), or Spouses Splinter Group (The SSG) at Muskoka. Neither of us being the Principal Morganeer in our conjugal partnerships, we feel there are other spouses who feel the alienation, loneliness and malaise that is inherent in such couplings, and who would benefit from such a Group for mutual support and therapy. News is presently out of date by the time the Correspondent in France receives the FAX but as of above date follows.


All went well with communication until the cars were into Russia when, as expected it became very difficult to send FAX messages. there is a gap of one week with no information but most recent message tells the crews are driving between ten & twelve hours a day & are very fatigued, However, morale is high & they "continue to be Mousquetairs" (quote).

The immensity of Russia has been astonishing. It seems to go on forever. this is what demoralised the soldiers of Napoleon's Army & later the Germans in WW2 & both only made it to Moscow! The roads have varied from good to horrible & they have had to drive off the road for very many kilometres as the surfaces were so bad.

The Morgans are undergoing the battering without problems except noises from suspensions & axles. The crews have been warmly welcomed all the way but particularly so in Siberia. Today they have left Russia & are en route for Ulan-Bater in Mongolia. It is believed they rested shortly at Inkukat near Lake Baikal.


They have asked the Correspondent to advise the Canadian enthisiasts that they are still on schedule.



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
