Morgan SCCC "Spring Fling" in South Western Ontario

Victoria Day Weekend, May 19-22, 1995

THE HOTEL: Duffy's Motor Inn, 296 Dalhousie Street, Amherstburg, Ontario.

The club has set aside a number of rooms at the club rate per night of \$48 + tax single occupancy or \$58 + tax for double occupancy. Duffy's is located right on the Detroit River in historic Amherstburg, with a view of Boblo Island. The hotel has its own Marina with licensed restaurant on site.

Amenities also include an outdoor pool, patio, exercise room, live entertainment on Friday and Saturday nights and golf nearby (Sorry, no pets). Parking for hotel guests is in a separate lot, away from the road, by the boat docks. All rooms have either two double beds or single king-size bed with Jacuzzi! Also: TV, phone, refrigerators, hair dryers and room service.

THE AREA: Within half a mile there are some 35 historic buildings dating back to the 1880's. There are no less than three wineries in the area (One which Vern Dale-Johnson has personal contacts with), as well as restaurants, antiques and other distractions, such as:

- -Boblo Island Amusement Park
- -Historic Fort Malden
- -Pelee Island
- -Point Pelee National Park
- -Windsor Casino
- -Canadian Club Distillery Tour

PELEE ISLAND: The largest island in Lake Erie and Canada's most southerly point. Only 9 miles long by 3.5 miles wide, it has some 55 miles of roads. Though small, the island has a number of attractions. Pelee Island Winery has a tour, including a BBQ your own lunch while you enjoy a a view of the Erie islands with a glass of their finest. A trading post sells waterford crystal, china, etc. on the island. There are also beaches, a nature reserve, stone lighthouse ruins, and the ruins of Canada's first Estate Winery est. 1865. Restaurants and Taverns are also on the island.

Access is of course by ferry. The MV Jimaan holds 40 vehicles and 400 passengers. The ferry departs from the dock at nearby Kingsville at 9AM. The journey is 1 hour 15 minutes. This would give us approximately 5 hours to explore the island, before our departure back to Kingsville at 4PM.

Subject: Tour de Monde 94 - Canadian Segment

(The three French gentlemen at the midpoint of their 'round-the-world' trip arrived in Seattle from Japan on July 23rd. Two other Mousquetaires had to return to France from Beijing, China for business reasons. See August Miscellany for latest report on segment from St. Petersbourg to Vladivostok. The vistors to North America were the two Mousquetaires - Jean-Louis Clavere, a biologist from Biarritz in southern France and Jean Ribot, a doctor from the Mediterranean island of Corsica. Accompanying them is Gerard Rossignol, the trip's photographer who is shooting their exploits for French television.)

I had just driven across central Washington state's Okonogan desert from Omak - home of the famous Omak Rodeo - via that beautiful Alpine lookalike village of Leavenworth (Currently threatened by a stubborn forest fire at the time of this writing), to Bellevue, when I suddenly realized how fortunate I was not to have been caught by the infamous 'Highway Patrol', after all my adrenalin had pushed my old '57 Plus Four to an average speed of 75 MPH en route.

When I abandoned my family in Oliver, B.C. to enjoy their annual one week vacation in the sun just after noon on this intensely hot Saturday, I headed for Omak in the family Marquis (1980) where I was to liaise with a friend who was to drive my Moggie from Vancouver through the lovely Northern Cascade Range and meet me at 3:00 at one of the watering holes on the main street of this comfortably small western town.

I arrived in Omak at 2:30, quaffed a couple American pints and proceeded to wait and sweat for the planned rendezvous. After several phone calls to my voice mailbox, my nervousness eased as my friend left a message indicating he had successfully navigated himself and my Moggie to the nearby town of Okonogan. I ordered the biggest burger the bar could muster and proceeded to relax over another much needed pint before meeting my friend about 4:20 or so.

We switched vehicles, he to return to Vancouver with my family car while I departed for Bellevue to meet the elusive Frenchmen. I had never pushed my Moggie to 85 MPH before

as I tended to either respect her age or distrust my workmanship. Alas, I arrived at the lovely waterfront home of Thea and Dave Wellington sometime after 9 that evening.

There were about eight or nine Morgans of various vintage out front of the Wellingtons when I arrived - more than fashionably late. Coincidentally, the three French adventurers had arrived only moments before, having been escorted from SeaTac airport by Mike and Rose Marie Powley - emminent MogNorthwesters from Vancouver.

That Saturday was, of course, the day of the Bellevue All British Field Meet which I had the sad misfortune of missing once again. I understand it was an outstanding event with beautiful weather and several hundred excellent examples of British coachmanship.

The next two days were spent enjoying the astounding beauty of Lake Washington with the wonderful hospitality of the Wellingtons. From a spectacular Seattle sunset as viewed from the middle of the lake to the bizarre nightlife of late night Seattle to witnessing the talented waterskiing exploits of Jean-Louis. Dave Wellington's exuberant son Andrew was not as easily amused when he was unceremoniously heaved into the drink by the beefy Jean Ribot, a physician from Corsica. (You see his rare imitation brand name wristwatch appeared to fail the nautical experience).

Sunday evening inspired Dave Wellington to unlock his film vault to show a classic MOG NorthWest adventure which took place several years back on Vancouver Island and culminated with more than a dozen Moggies assembled at the home of George and Lydia Sterne (George or GB as he was known of vintage Morgan racing fame in western Canada for the better part of four decades). Then Dave showed a wonderful little video called "Rendezvous" about a famous French filmmaker who, early one morning, filmed himself racing through the deserted streets of Paris at astounding speeds in his Ferrari, towards a very worthwhile rendezvous. Splendid!

On Monday, I was to depart with compatriot Mike Powley who had stayed the extra day, for Vancouver, to return to my new business. Alas, my battery indicated I was to stay yet another day; oh darn. Mike had to depart himself due to an unfortunate preplanned rendezvous he had with the Sheriff in the huge metropolis of Concrete in northern Washington. Seems he had been cited proceeding "trop vite" on a previous visit. Stay tuned for the result from that encounter.

That evening, Thea Wellington prepared a scrumptious outdoor repast for the three French visitors and myself. Superb steaks and oysters barbequed in the shell accompanied by a very special vintage wine graciously introduced for this occasion by Monsiour Wellington.

Coincidentally, it was the 30th anniversary for Dave and Thea and Les Mousquetaires had a wonderful surprise for them. After the meal, they performed a superb rendition of their Mousquetaire song to celebrate the occasion. Not to be outdone, Dave presented each Mousquetaire with a pair of bottles of "Morgan" wine from California,

On Tuesday morning I did depart for Vancouver knowing I would again get to enjoy the company of these global adventurers upon their arrival in Vancouver two days hence. As their vehicles were due to arrive from Yokohama on Wednesday - three days later than the schedule indicated, we managed to convince the Mousquetaires to consider abandoning their original plans to proceed to Anchorage, Alaska from Seattle/Vancouver. They were unaware that the journey would likely consume the better part of a week before they could arrive in Calgary en route to Yellowstone and the continuation of their U.S. segment.

Hopefully, you can look at the accompanying photo of the two Moggies entering

Canada from the U.S. at White Rock just south of Vancouver. Vern D-J had coincidentally
been in Vancouver prior to the arrival of his family when he happened to drop in to my house
on Tuesday afternoon shortly after I arrived from Bellevue. We anticipated the arrival of the
Mousquetaires sometime Thursday pending U.S. customs/immigration eventualities.

Although the vessel was to dock at 8AM Wednesday morning, the container containing the
two Moggies was not scheduled to be unloaded til 9PM Wed. nite. Dave and the Frenchmen
travelled to Tacoma to attack the bureaucracy in the interim (Weds. afternoon). Initially,
an American immigration official indicated that they would best return to get their vehicles
on MONDAY, five days hence. Fortunately, the famous French charm of Jean-Louis
succeeded in persuading a female immigration official that the next day - Thursday - would
be a much more suitable day for them to receive their vehicles. Vive la charisma, non!

Apparently the first official was not impressed by the fact that the "Carnet de Passage" or
official travel documents for the vehicles was "en francais" and not "american".

Finally, they arrived in Canada where Vern and I greeted them at the border at about 7:30PM Thursday evening. 






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George Watson with Paul Donoghue wondering where he can get a shirt like that? CMC BBQ July/94 V. Dale-Johnson

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
